


What is urban design?

Urban design is the shaping of the physical form of a place so that the buildings, streets, parks, and public spaces work in harmony to create a dynamic, welcoming place that supports a thriving public life.

Successful urban design creates a strong public realm.

The **public realm** is any space or built environment that is open and accessible for public use, regardless of ownership. It includes streets, sidewalks, plazas, parks, and open spaces.



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
Community engagement in the fall of 2023 included regular coordination with municipalities, residents, and stakeholders.

The study highlights the urban design strengths and needs of this cross-jurisdictional transit-oriented community.


- Worked with engagement consultant Brick & Story





REGIONAL CONTEXT: COUNTY DOWNTOWNS



- Major roads as "spines" that support activity corridors
- Bethesda and Silver Spring are more integrated with their surroundings than Wheaton and Friendship Heights







URBAN DESIGN NETWORK ANALYSIS


Analysis of four urban "networks"

- Pedestrian network
- Transportation network
- Open Space network
- Community Amenities network
- Staff completed 6 site visits from July October 2023
- Engagement questions focused on network

- Strong, continuous sidewalk network
- Mature tree canopy in many places
- Many high visibility crosswalks
- Signalized mid-block crossings



There are limited connections between Friendship Heights and the surrounding neighborhoods



Street Activation: Wisconsin Avenue and North Park Avenue











Street Activation: Willard Avenue / The Hills Plaza








Many residential high-rise buildings have car-centric front entrances





- 85% of questionnaire respondents named walkability as strength of the area
- 21% of respondents felt "comfortable everywhere in Friendship Heights"
- Some respondents expressed safety concerns about walking at night: lighting, crossing streets and speeding vehicles.




TRANSPORTATION NETWORK: WHAT WE SAW


- Access to Metrorail Red Line, WMATA bus, Ride On bus
- Village of Friendship Heights operates a shuttle
- No dedicated bike facilities built; several planned in 2018 Bicycle Master Plan



TRANSPORTATION NETWORK: WHAT WE HEARD

Many stakeholders named the Metrorail as "Friendship Heights' greatest asset." Few respondents reported using bicycles, scooters, or rideshare services





OPEN SPACE NETWORK: WHAT WE SAW

- Analysis included M-NCPPC parks, privately owned publicly accessible (POPS) spaces and parks owned by other municipalities
- Considered ownership and experience



OPEN SPACE NETWORK: WHAT WE SAW


- Many parks and green spaces in the downtown, and most are easy to access
- Hubert Humphrey Park activated by the Community Center
- Willard Ave and Brookdale only parks with active recreation opportunities



OPEN SPACE NETWORK: WHAT WE HEARD


- Humphrey Park is visited most often, but may reflect many Village respondents
- GEICO lawn used by many on weekends, often for recreation
- Some respondents did not visit a park because they did not know where it was located

COMMUNITY AMENITIES: WHAT WE SAW

- Whole Foods is a key destination; medical services also draw people to FH
- Village Community Center and Wisconsin Avenue Rec Center are enjoyed by many
- Independent pharmacies but no large chains that are open later
- Public art throughout Friendship Heights enhances the public realm








COMMUNITY AMENITIES: WHAT WE HEARD

- Restaurants are most popular favorite amenity, particularly those with sizable outdoor eating areas.
- Respondents specifically noted lack of movie theater and other arts/culture amenities
- Many noted lack of affordable retail






LESSONS LEARNED



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Assets of Friendship Heights


- Easy access to multiple modes of transit including Metrorail station
- Strong and safe pedestrian network; mature tree canopy shades many streets
- Variety of green spaces throughout the downtown provide shaded areas for rest; several outdoor areas for community gatherings or events
- Strong active retail corridor on Wisconsin Avenue



LESSONS LEARNED

Areas for Further Study

- Downtown is not well-connected to the surrounding neighborhoods
- Limited opportunities for active recreation in the downtown, public parks at the periphery are hard to access; several sizable public spaces that are often empty
- Stakeholders feel unsafe along some streets due to lighting, visibility and vehicular speeds
- Many building entrances designed to privilege automobiles, despite the walkable nature of the area
